BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Hilton Ultimus Brown (1859–1958) was born in Indianapolis and graduated from Butler University with a B.A. in 1880 and an M.A. in 1882. After one year as principal of Oaktown Academy, he began his career with the *Indianapolis News*, which spanned 77 years. Starting as a reporter, Brown subsequently became city editor, managing editor, secretary-treasurer, and a member of the board of directors. Brown was named vice-president of Indianapolis Newspapers Inc., when it was formed in 1948. Over his career, Brown covered the Treaty of Versailles and served as an escort for Queen Marie of Romania during her Indianapolis visit in the 1920s. He received national recognition for his series of articles on Russia and post–World War I Europe's economic plight.

In addition to his newspaper responsibilities, Brown served as a trustee for Butler University from 1885–1955. He also served as the university's president for 52 years. Brown was a member of the board of directors of the American Newspaper Publishers Association from 1903–35 and was active in the town of Irvington and the Disciples of Christ.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The collection consists primarily of Brown's scrapbooks, which include clippings of newspaper articles he wrote while serving as a correspondent in the Soviet Union (1926). There also are clippings regarding World War I and the U. S. Army in Mexico (1916–19). One of Brown's sons, Hilton U. Brown, died during the war. Additional subjects include clippings and papers relating to Brown's civic and personal affairs. Also included is Brown's family and personal correspondence (1898–1953). Correspondence includes_letters from his sons in the U. S. Army during World War I (1916–18), papers relating to Butler University, and materials relating to the operations of the *Indianapolis News* under the ownership of William Henry Smith, Delavan Smith, and Charles W. Fairbanks (1893–1922). The collection also contains papers relating to the estate of William Henry Smith (1896–98).

Photographs in the collection include tintypes and cartes de visites of family members, friends, and students at Butler College and Indianapolis High School. There are also portraits of Hilton U. Brown and photographs of soldiers in Mexico.
