BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Robert Barclay Smith (1834–1900) was born in Loudon County, Virginia, the son of Seth and Mary Taylor-Janney Smith. The family relocated to Richmond, Wayne County, Indiana, in the mid-1850s. Robert entered the dry goods business as clerk, first living in Milton, Wayne County, then moving in 1856 to New Castle, Henry County, where he eventually opened his own store. On 3 October 1861 he married Catherine (Kate) Taylor. They had five children: Arthur, J. Harry, Lynn, Mary, and Clarence. Smith was deeply involved in Republican Party politics and, although his family was Quaker, he was active in the Presbyterian Church.

During the Civil War he was never drafted but had a brother-in-law, George O. Taylor, who was stationed in Kentucky; and his niece's husband, William L. James, was stationed at Fort Monroe, Virginia, where he was Assistant Quartermaster for Union forces.

In the late 1880s and throughout the 1890s his wife and children, Mary and Clarence, experienced poor health. They often went to Hendersonville, North Carolina, for therapy, staying there for an extended period in 1898. Smith consequently spent his time commuting between North Carolina and Indiana, where he continued his dry goods business.

Harry joined his father in dry goods but the other children scattered. Arthur, with his wife Grace and their children, worked as a clerk at the Second National Bank of Richmond. Lynn became a businessman in Alaska, while Clarence, because of chronic illness, spent time at health facilities in Chicago and North Carolina when not in New Castle. He also visited relatives in Alabama and Indiana. In 1904 Mary became the wife of Herbert Heller, of Heller Brothers floral company in New Castle. Their wedding trip included St. Louis (and the World's Fair), Virginia Beach, and New York. In subsequent years they visited health spas in Martinsville, Indiana, and Battle Creek, Michigan.

Robert Smith fell ill in the spring of 1900 and died in New Castle in July of that year.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The Robert B. Smith papers fall into two main, though not exclusive, categories: correspondence and diaries. The bulk of the correspondence cover the years 1849 through 1911, but there are individual letters from 1915, 1921, and 1942. Correspondents vary, but most are either relatives of Smith or his wife, or are close acquaintances. Much of the family correspondence is from Smith's sisters in Richmond, Indiana, with smaller amounts from Columbus, Ohio; Illinois; the vicinity of Leavenworth, Kansas; and Alabama. Judge E. B. Martindale, a prominent politician and Kate's brother-in-law, also wrote often, usually from Indianapolis. Early family letters concern the move from Virginia to Indiana and efforts at making a living there. Civil War letters generally reflect life at home, but there are a few army letters from Kentucky and Fort Monroe, Virginia, sent by Smith's brother-in-law, George Taylor, and nephew by marriage, Will James.

The last decades of the nineteenth century and early years of the twentieth century are dominated by letters from Kate and Robert's children. Arthur wrote home from Richmond and correspondence flourished during the 1890s between Robert and Harry in New Castle and Kate, Mary, and Clarence in North Carolina. In 1893 Clarence wrote from a Chicago health facility, although little is said about the World's Fair held there that year. Letters from Mary's 1904 wedding trip tell of St. Louis, Virginia Beach, and New York. There are also detailed descriptions of early twentieth-century health spas in Martinsville, Indiana, and Battle Creek, Michigan.

Family letters throughout the collection generally center on family members and their health and activities, with a smattering of politics and news of both the Civil War and the Spanish-American War. Not all correspondence was directed to Kate or Robert; much was between other family members. The collection also includes letters related to Robert's dry goods business.

Smith's diaries begin in 1855 and continue through July 1900. Entries cover a wide range of topics, including weather, letters received, quotations (scriptural and literary), and miscellaneous historical, scientific, or etymological facts. Because of his strong political inclination, local and national politics come up frequently, as does his opinion of national and world events. The back pages of early volumes include a summary and evaluation of the preceding year, while those of later volumes are devoted to accounts and addresses. In all, the diaries make up 93 volumes.

Other items in the collection include Smith's cash books and ledgers, 1850–82; a Smith family home expense book, 1900–02; order books for the C. E. White Grain and Coal Company, 1931–39; and voter registration information, ca. 1900–04.
