BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Thomas Decker Cochrun was born 23 August 1946 in Indianapolis, Indiana. He is the son of Karl W. Cochrun of Muncie and Mary Helen Decker of Bluffton. As a Warren Central High School student, Tom worked as a sports stringer for the *Indianapolis Times*. During his college days at Ball State University he worked for Muncie radio station WERK as a newscaster and general assignment reporter. After graduating in 1968, Cochrun traveled to Europe where he did freelance pieces on the anti-Vietnam movement among European youth. He returned home in 1969 and took a position at WIBC/WNAP radio where he reported on police, city hall, and state house news. That year he married Lana Elmore at the Grace Lutheran Church in Muncie. The couple eventually had two daughters: Kristin Elizabeth and Katherine Meredith. In 1979 Cochrun went to work for CBS affiliate WISH Television were he produced the evening news magazine.

In 1981 he transferred to NBC affiliate WTHR Television where he became a senior news anchor and an award-winning investigative reporter and producer. During his fourteen years at WTHR Cochrun won numerous local and national awards for his documentaries. In 1981 he followed Ku Klux Klan leader Bill Wilkinson to Connecticut for an investigation into the resurgence of the KKK. Cochrun interviewed political officials, KKK victims, religious leaders, and KKK members during his investigation. Using these results, Cochrun wrote and produced the documentary *Klan*. The program premiered on 30 December 1981 to critical acclaim. The documentary netted Cochrun numerous awards including the 1981 Edward Willis Scripps Award for First Amendment Reporting, an Emmy in 1982, and a 1983 Ohio State Award from the Institution for Education by Radio-Television. In 1982 the Indiana Jaycees named him an Outstanding Young Hoosier.

Cochrun wrote and produced numerous other award-winning documentaries for WTHR including *The Secret War at Home* (1986) in which he exposed two Soviet KGB agents visiting America, *Indiana's James Bond* (1986) about American spy William King Harvey. He also produced *Shelter of Shame* (1984) about the deplorable conditions of public housing in Indianapolis, and *Who is Protecting our Children?* (1985) about sexual victimization of children. Cochrun's other investigations covered topics ranging from civil rights to natural disasters, presidential campaigns to medical research.

In 1994 he founded Nineteenth Star, a film company that provided creative media services for institutional clients. Cochrun served as the president and CEO of the company and later its chief creative officer. Nineteenth Star produced pieces for The Discovery Channel, TLC, Court TV, PBS, and The Travel Channel. The company also coordinated video and interactive elements for the Indiana State Museum, Conner Prairie, and the Soldiers and Sailors Monument in Indianapolis. When Nineteenth Star was purchased during a merger, Cochrun and his associate Ben Stout founded

Masters Work Media, a production company that provides interactive programming for cultural institutions. In addition to his television work, Cochrun authored *The Sanibel Arcanum* (1994) and *The Sanibel Cayman Disc* (1999), and professional guide *Crisis Coverage and News Room Credibility* (1996).

In 2003 Cochrun returned to CBS affiliate WISH Television as the News Director. He is very active in the Indianapolis cultural community, serving as the president of the Benjamin Harrison Home Foundation Board and president of the Writers Center of Indiana. He is active in the Second Presbyterian Church and is involved with the Heartland Film Festival, Hooks Discovery and Learning Center, the Red Mask Foundation, and the Indianapolis Press Club.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

This collection consists of materials related to Tom Cochrun's investigative reporting including research files, interviews, notes, photographs, and film footage. The collection is divided into three series, the first containing research files and interviews for the documentary *Klan* as well as a copy of the program itself. These materials include newspaper articles and Associated Press wires about the resurgence of the Ku Klux Klan in the 1980s, anti-Klan publications such as *The Monitor* and *Klanwatch Intelligence Report*, photographs of burning crosses, and Cochrun's notebooks. There are also transcripts of interviews with officials opposed to Klan activity including Mayor William Hudnut and Reverend Jackson. In these interviews, the officials comment on the dangers of the resurgence of the KKK and they give their plans to protect people from its influence. There are also interviews with victims of Klan violence including Anthony Malone and President Gibbs of the Madison NAACP, as well as interviews with Klan members. The series also contains promotional materials for television miniseries *Cross of Fire* as well as author William Lutzholtz' response to the liberties that the miniseries took concerning the murder trial of D.C. Stevenson. There is information about the awards that *Klan* won during the early 1980s.

The second series contains materials related to Cold War intelligence and international espionage. The first folder in the series contains research files about Xenophon Kalamantiano, an American businessman who was imprisoned in Russia for three years, accused of spying for the United States. The second folder in the series contains articles and research related to the capture of American James Denby in Nicaragua. There are letters from Representative Dan Burton to Cochrun concerning the trip that the two of them took in 1987 to investigate the matter. The folder also contains an itinerary of Cochrun's visit to Mangua as well as invitations to dine at the American Embassy. The collection contains a copy of Cochrun's television reports of Denby's confinement and the Sandinista activity in Nicaragua. The rest of the series is related to American super-spy William King Harvey and his involvement with the Bay of Pigs Incident. Included are Harvey's FBI U.S. Civil Service Certificate of Medical Examination as well as copies of his 1940 evaluation to become a special agent. There are also transcripts of interviews with Harvey's daughter Sally, Tom Huston, Art Thurston, Robert Crowley, and Reverend David Kahlenberger. The two documentaries in the series are *The Secret War at Home* and *America's James Bond*.

The third series contains material related to Cochrun's special investigations into Indianapolis issues. Documentary *Shelter of Shame* is about the deplorable conditions of public housing in Indianapolis and the files in the collection

include letters from HUD officials, messages from Mayor Hudnut, and newspaper articles. The second folder in the series, containing materials from *Who is Protecting Our Children?*, is restricted because it contains material of a graphic and disturbing nature and may be viewed only with the permission of the Director of Manuscripts and Visual Collections. The file contains letters from abuse victims and their parents as well as from Planned Parenthood and The Church Federation of Greater Indianapolis. The series also contains copies of news stories that Cochrun filmed during his work at WTHR.
