BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

The Greenback Party, also known as the National Independent Party, was formed due to the monetary concerns of the post Civil War period and to the agrarian discontent following the panic of 1873. "Greenbacks" was the popular name of the first paper money issued by the United State government in 1862. Support for the greenback policy led to the formation of this new third political party. At Indianapolis in May 1876, the party nominated Peter Cooper for president. It continued to participate in presidential campaigns until 1884.

No information regarding the Waterloo Greenback Club could be located in available sources.

Benjamin Blair (b. 1833), the son of John Blair, was a druggist and grocer in Newville, Indiana (DeKalb Co.). Born in Lorain County, Ohio, Blair moved with his family to DeKalb County in 1835. He moved to Newville in 1862 and engaged in the livestock trade until 1876.

In 1863, Blair married Caroline A. Dodge (b. 1840), a native of Newville. They had two children, Belle and Don Juan. Blair served as county commissioner from 1876 to 1880. He was a shareholder and co-founder of the Newville Hotel Company, which was formed in 1872 to build a hotel in that town. He began his pharmacy and grocery business in 1884.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

Members who signed the letter include William Wallace, Eli Yarnell Williamson, Harmon Lydecker, Dr. D. Dunlop (?), J. S. Holly, and Dr. J.U. Winslow (?).
