## **BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Zalman Cohen arrived in Indianapolis ca. 1931 and worked as a teacher for the Jewish Education Association until ca. 1937. Cohen taught at the Rabbi Neustadt United Hebrew School from ca. 1937 to ca. 1940, and from ca. 1943 to ca. 1946. He is not listed in "Polk's Indianapolis Directory" in 1941 or 1942. The 1946 edition of Polk's Directory lists Cohen's occupation as "photographer." Cohen operated the Zalman Studio at various locations in Indianapolis from ca. 1956 to ca. 1970. He died ca. 1971.

Cohen changed his home address frequently during his years as a teacher. His addresses included: rear, 2258 North Meridian, Apt. 308 (ca. 1931); rear, 2344 North Illinois (ca. 1932); rear, 2239 North Illinois (ca. 1934–ca. 1937); rear, 1205 North Alabama Street (ca. 1938); rear, 1205 North Alabama (ca. 1943). During his career as a photographer Cohen lived at 3353 North Central (ca. 1947–ca. 1956); 1455 North Pennsylvania (ca. 1957–ca. 1970); and 1842 N. Delaware (ca. 1971).

## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The collection contains approximately 100 cellulose acetate negatives made by Indianapolis photographer Zalman Cohen, and 28 contact sheets printed from these negatives. The images include scenes from the 1958 and 1959 Indianapolis 500 parades, the opening of the Planned Parenthood Center at Wannamaker, Indiana, in 1957; and winners of the Indianapolis Symphony Instrumentalist contest, 1958. The photographs also document activities of the Latvian community in Indianapolis, including a visit to the city by Latvian students in 1956 and 1957.
