#### HISTORICAL SKETCH

The flood of 1913, also known as the "Great Flood of March 1913," was part of a regional disaster that devastated much of the Midwest and Ohio River valley. The central two thirds of Indiana were heavily flooded, which resulted in 200 deaths and left 200,000 people homeless. In Indianapolis, the White River crested at an estimated 31.5 feet, and levees broke along the river and creeks throughout the city. In Broad Ripple, the city was underwater for two and a half days and suffered significant damage to the jail.

#### **BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH**

Elma Gillaspy Hoyt was born 19 January 1908 in Marion County. Her parents, Omer Gillaspy (est. birth year 1879) and Rose Lehmann Gillaspy (born 20 November 1884), were married in Jefferson City, Missouri and moved to Broad Ripple before Elma's birth in 1908. Omer Gillaspy worked as a conductor for Union Traction Company. The family lived on East 64<sup>th</sup> Street in Broad Ripple, according to the 1930 census. Elma later married Louis Henry Hoyt, also from Indianapolis.

#### SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The collection contains six photographs of the 1913 flood in Broad Ripple, Ind. On the backs of each of the photographs are hand-written descriptions, presumably written by Elma Gillaspy Hoyt, of the locations, residences,

and businesses depicted in the photographs. The collection also contains one photograph dated 1913 that was not taken during the flood. This image is of conductor Omer Gillaspy, the donor's father, in front of a Union Traction interurban.
