Edghill Burnside (1797–1859) was born in Laurens County, South Carolina. He moved to Union, Franklin County, Indiana, around 1820 and married Jane Dill, on February 27, 1844 in Union, Indiana and they had six children. Burnside was a lawyer and became a judge by 1850.

SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The collection consists of nine items.

The first is a bill for \$269.64 for merchandise purchased between April 6, 1832 and January 29, 1833. (3/20/1833)

The second is a letter written to J.P Moore and Burnside, and speaks of money and the new hires at his store, Mr. Williams and Mr. Ohosville. (7/12/1833)

The third is a letter written by John Reily and speaks of the marriage between Mr. Wheeler and Mrs. Cannon. (12/31/1833)

The fourth is a letter written by Mr. Williams and speaks of E.B. Bishop returning from the East with a bill of \$5,500.00 of good purchases, which has to be paid in six months. Williams tells Burnside that this is not enough time to pay this bill. (5/7/1834)

The fifth is a bill addressed to Burnside and Williams \$150.00. (7/16/1834)

The sixth is a note addressed to Burnside and Williams, and speaks of \$117.00 being credited to their note. (11/5/1834)

The seventh is a letter written by Isaac Milland, and speaks about debts that are owed to clients and how much money they have to pay these debts. Isaac wants to avoid getting more credit, because he doesn't think they can pay it off. He wants to raise the money, if possible. (11/7/1834)

The eighth is a reply written by Mr. Burnside that he is accepting an invitation for dinner, and asking on October 23 to have a get together with J.M. and others if it is not too much trouble. (12/8/1870)

The ninth is a letter asking if J.W. Palmer will take good care of his Hoosier friends. Written by Mr. Beeches. (6/1/1872)
