HISTORICAL SKETCH

Mary E. Hausenfluck (b. 1801) lived in Maurertown, Shenandoah County, Virginia, in 1877. She wrote to her daughter, Lydia Hottle, in Corydon, Harrison County, Indiana. Harrison County histories do not carry any entries under

Hottle, though there are several for Hottell.

SCOPE AND CONTENT

This collection contains one item, a photocopy of an 1877 letter from Mary E. Hausenfluck in Virginia to her daughter Lydia Hottle in Corydon, Indiana. The writer, at 76, is living alone and is lonesome. [Her daughter?] Rebecca has moved away. She has sent some money to Lydia (please send a receipt), and is glad to get her grandson's picture. [Son?] Joel is in debt; the Yankees nearly broke him up. Mary's niece Lydia Good (now Lydia Rinker and a near neighbor) wrote this letter.
