BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Florence McClure was born in Mount Pleasant, Iowa on August 12, 1892. Her parents, Charles Arthur McClure and Margaret Marshall McClure moved to Missouri after Florence was born. There they farmed land owned by an uncle. Florence had five siblings, Elmer, Clarence, Clara who died in Missouri, George, and Marvin.

While in Missouri, Mrs. McClure became ill with tuberculosis and the family returned to Iowa in hopes of getting her to Colorado for treatment, but she died in January 1901. After her mother's death her father worked on the railroad and Florence and her brothers lived with various neighbors and relatives.

Her father learned of a newly formed orphanage in Indianapolis run by the Pentecostal Bands of the World and decided to send Florence, then ten, to the orphanage in August 1902. Eventually her father brought Florence's four brothers to the orphanage where they could all be together.

The orphanage was originally located on the outskirts of east Indianapolis near the Washington Street car line. The orphanage later moved to several acres of land in Plainfield, Indiana. Florence stayed at the orphanage for five and a half years before she and her brothers returned to their father who was now farming in Mississippi with relatives. There she kept house for her father, uncles and brothers while they farmed.

Realizing there was no future for her on the farm she was able to return to Iowa where cousins helped her enter nurse's training at a local hospital. She completed her nurse's training in 1913. Soon after she met Oliver Dwight Harlan; the couple married in 1914 and had four children.
