Pike County, Account Book of Robert Logan, Highbanks, Indiana, 1850

Highbanks, a town once located nine miles east of Petersburgh along the south side of the White River, was the second community established in Pike County, Indiana. Families from North Carolina, Virginia, and Kentucky moved into the area as early as 1813, and six years later Highbanks officially became a town. Highbanks's decline in the mid- to late-nineteenth century began after a nearby railroad line bypassed it. By 1963 the town no longer existed.¹

One of the commercial establishments found in Highbanks during the early 1850s was Robert Logan's general store. Logan (1808–1872), a native of Scotland, arrived in Pike County in the 1830s from Virginia. He married Elizabeth White (1813–1873), who was born in England. The Logans had approximately nine children—Mary Elizabeth (1830–1847), wife of Henry Gray (1819–1856); Sarah J. (1834–1850); Amanda Eliza (1840–1858), wife of Jesse L. Thomas; Robert W. (1844–1878); Andrew Jackson (1846–1858); Allas/Alice? M. (abt. 1849–aft. 1870); Linda (1851–1851); Albert (abt. 1852–aft. 1860); and Joseph W. (1854–1872). Besides owning a store, Logan butchered and cured meat that he shipped by river to New Orleans. He also served as a state representative for Pike County in the Indiana General Assembly throughout the 1840s as well in 1869 and 1871. Logan and his wife Elizabeth moved to Washington, Indiana, in neighboring Daviess County, about one year before his death in 1872.²

Logan's account books provide insight into the items purchased in the early 1850s and confirm the presence of the area's inhabitants. The types of merchandise sold by Logan cover a wide range of items for personal, household, and barnyard use, such as shaving soap, combs, shoes, paper, slate and lead pencils, sugar, salt, coffee, rice, allspice, tobacco, spoons, Irish linen, calico, buttons, a mahogany mirror, tin lamps, wood buckets, horse collars, axes, and nails. The following alphabetized list includes the names of those who purchased items from Logan on credit, made payment for a previous debt, or paid a portion of another's debt between January

and March 1850. To determine what each patron purchased and how much he or she paid or owed, consult the complete account book. Owned by great-grandson Foster Logan, Otwell, Indiana, Robert Logan's account books for 1850/51 and 1853/54 were microfilmed in 1967. The Indiana Historical Society's William H. Smith Memorial Library houses both books on two microfilm reels: reel F0010, 1850–1851; reel 356, 1853–1854.³
